

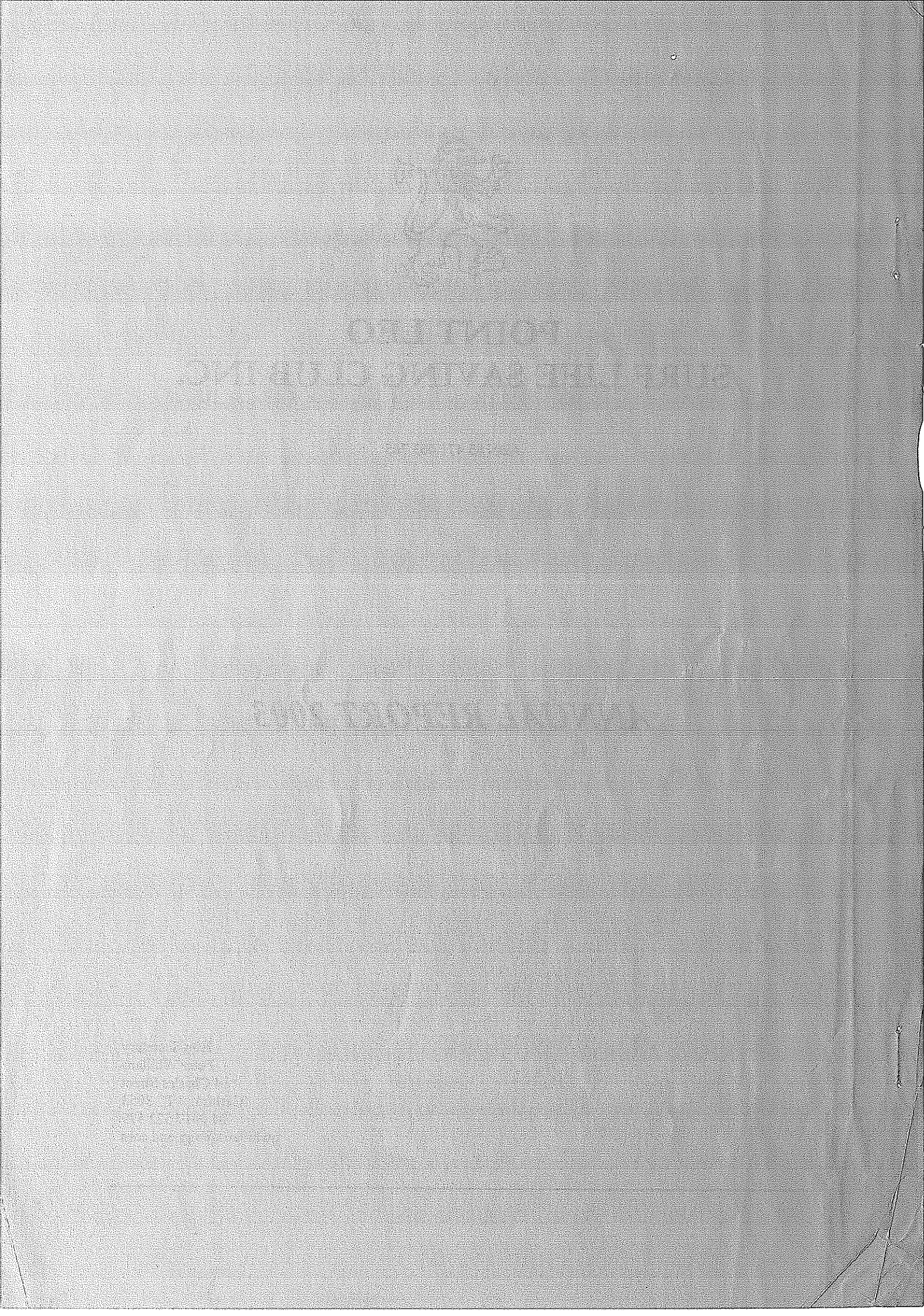

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PRESIDENT REPORT

I am please to provide this my second report as President of Point Leo Surf Life Saving Club.

In the body of this report you will read details of individual and collective achievements, disappointments, aspirations and various tall (but true) tales from the various section heads. What I would like to do is provide a context for the many facets of our Club.

In concluding my report last year I suggested that our challenge was to rebuild our “war chest” after the demands of our building program of the past few years. Building our financial position would allow us to provide appropriate support for our competition team, so that those who compete for Point Leo are not financially penalised for their loyalty. Additionally I set the task of maintaining the facilities and equipment that we have worked so hard to obtain.

It is gratifying to be able to report that those challenges have been met. The Club has had a sound year financially through a combination of active fund raising and building relationships with sponsors and cost consciousness and careful expenditure on the other hand. In the final result we have been able to rebuild our cash reserves, maintain and enhance our gear, equipment and facilities. Importantly without compromising our support for our patrolling surf lifesavers we were able this year to assist our competitors by meeting accommodation costs at the National Titles and contributing to those costs at the State Titles.

Some of the Key Financial Statistics for the year were:

- Net income (after offsetting cost of sales/fundraising) increased from approx \$109,000 in 2002 to \$118,000 in 2003. This is an excellent outcome when one considers that last year’s income included the final government grant of over \$20,000 towards the new building.

- Expenses rose by \$25,000, principally to cover Competition (Carnival) Costs & Subsidies (up \$17,500) and Insurance, Training and Patrols (each up \$2,000).

Our single biggest expense however continues to be Depreciation (\$36,000). After accounting for this 'non cash' expense the Club's Expenses exceeded Revenues by around \$2,000. As noted above however, our cash position improved substantially and overall our financial standing is excellent.

These Financial results are not an end in themselves. The real purpose is to ensure that we meet the needs and aspirations of our members and the broader community. Importantly the spirit of the Club is as strong as I have ever seen it

The 2003/04 year has again been a very full one. As I promised above I will limit myself to a few highlights.

The year started well before summer arrived with our first "annual" snow trip. Dan Szabo did a brilliant job organising four days at Mt Buller a combination of excellent catering, great weather and endless desire for fun ensured the success of the trip. Let us hope the second annual ski event can match.

Social events continued in the lead up to summer. In September we held the more informal "AFL Grand Final Beer and Pie" event. Things took on a more formal air however with an extremely well attended Dinner and Wine Auction in October. Around 150 guests engaged in some spirited bidding for all items with the final result, a resounding success with some \$14,000 being raised on the night. The organising committee of Peter Whillans, Gary Randal, Eddie Kidd, Roger Sowerby, Jill McKellar, John Horwood, Chris Fennell and Simon Merrigan did a brilliant job.

December saw our traditional Bronze Camp being conducted. Janis Caddie-House, our Chief Instructor, ran an incredibly successful week with a supremely enthusiastic and positive group of young people participating in the course. The great team spirit was in evidence when the squad did their run-swim-run: they ran together, entered the water together and then as they emerged from the water waited for the last

swimmer to come in before doing the final run as a group. Many of these new Bronzies went on to immediately provide water safety at the John Marshall Swim and participated in patrols.

This year, for the first time in several years, the sun shone on the John Marshall Swim on Boxing Day. Total registrations were just under 350 for the day, which is the best turnout in many years. Recognition must go to the people who put in the work throughout the year as well as on the day in conducting the swim, in particular Andrew Gibson and John Horwood together with Andrew Jeffrey, Mark Tierney and James Keeran. They were assisted by an excellent turnout of volunteers. The day also proved to be a financial winner thanks to the support of our sponsors and donors, in particular principal sponsor Clyde Davenport and Davenport Industries.

Sponsorships played an important part in providing financial support for the Club's activities. The Committee was particularly pleased to welcome a substantial sponsorship from Tooheys. This coincided with our very successful "first toe in the water" in conducting our Bar on a more professional basis over summer. Kim Williams was instrumental in ensuring that the "Dudes Bar" worked well socially, financially and complied with all licensing requirements. Other major supporters during the year were Macquarie Bank, Baker and McKenzie, Hillview Quarries and CB Richard Ellis.

Our all-important patrols again ran very professionally and efficiently and, with the exception of a minor technical infringement, performed extremely well. We are fortunate indeed to have a dynamic duo in Adam Woods as Club Captain and Andrew Gibson as Vice Captain to undertake the substantial task of organising our patrols. A critical adjunct to this is the hard work undertaken by Richard Ellis in his various roles as Gear Steward and IRB Captain. Our gear, in particular our IRB's, have never operated so well.

January was predictably very busy. Jennyann Goodman demonstrated her stamina by running a very busy Nipper Program again this year and it was pleasing to see so many willing volunteers to assist her whether in water safety instruction or general

marshalling. After improving the program year after year, the question is “what next?”

Over the season the Club fielded a highly enthusiastic competitive team and we were able to take some of the financial burden off our competitors with financial support for accommodation at both the National Titles in Warrnambool and the Aussies at Kurrawa. It was particularly pleasing to see resurgence in the R & R section with three teams competing this year at the Nationals. Credit must go to Kim, Khali and Simone Williams for their hard work and persistence in keeping R & R alive at Point Leo. We are also indebted to Geoff “Blab” Waters who, despite commitments on the other side of the coast provided valuable coaching support to all our teams.

The season concluded with a well attended club championship in April. Interesting additions to the championships were a theory exam set by our Club Captain; this was followed by a huge turnout at the Balnarring Races on Easter Monday where law firm Baker and Mackenzie sponsored the Point Leo Nippers Handicap.

Our final season event was the presentation night on 7 June. Again we had a brilliant turnout of around 120 members from all sections of the Club to witness an extensive range of Awards being made to variously, our bravest, brightest or just our loudest members. Adam and Andrew had fun bouncing off each other as joint M-Cs. Congratulations go to the recipients of the Club’s major awards for the year: Kim Williams (*President’s Trophy – Senior*); David Morris (*President’s Trophy – Junior*); and Chris Fennell (*Dick Catterick Award*). More details of the achievements of these very special contributors to the Club appear later in this Annual Report.

It is particularly pleasing to be able to recognise Chris Fennell who is standing down this year after many years as the Honorary Club Treasurer. Our thanks go to Chris for his hard work, diligence, good humour and integrity.

I should also mention that this year Peter Whillans, our Honorary Secretary, received the Surf Life Saving Victoria Volunteer of the Year Award. Peter is a worthy recipient, having contributed to surf life saving over the years in many roles, including Junior Activities Co-ordinator, IRB Captain, Chief Instructor and Club Secretary. He

continues to be active in training and fund raising as well as administration and exemplifies the spirit of volunteering that exists throughout our Club.

Finally, we have all been blessed with a harmonious and hard working Committee again this year and I thank them for their energy, wise counsel and support. I continue to remain indebted to John Horwood, immediate past President, who seems to be doing more than ever before.

Point Leo SLSC continues to be a source of great pride and enjoyment for me and I have appreciated the opportunity to serve as President for the past twelve months. I am confident that with the ongoing support and involvement of our members, we can all look forward to another great year in 2003/04.

- IRB motors gave minimal problems on Patrol.
- The Patrol Shelter was repaired twice and is wearing out.
- Rescue boards required a high level of repair but there were always sufficient for Patrol purposes.

NIPPERS STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS AT TORQUAY

80 Point Leo Nippers competed at Torquay in the State Championships. As expected winter weather conditions prevailed for the duration of the carnival. Nippers were confronted with strong winds, regular rainsqualls and 2-3 metre swell. SLSV were determined to hold the event at Torquay surf beach where conditions were obviously suitable for experienced surfers only. Finally, common sense prevailed and the

carnival was moved around the bay to Cosy Corner which still provided suitably challenging conditions for the Nippers.

TEAM SPIRIT

Team spirit was high, not only amongst the Nippers but also amongst the parents who rallied time and time again to support our team. With the experience gained from putting the tent up and down four times over the weekend many of our parents could find future employment working for Ashton's Circus. Even dinner at the Torquay Pub provided a challenge when our booking for 150 wasn't taken seriously. Nonetheless, we all managed to squeeze in to enjoy a few drinks and a good meal together.

Thank you to Ewen Ellis, Monty Frankish, Felicity Keeran, Jessica Bird, Melissa Cooper and Catherine Birch for doing water safety for us. Liz Bird and John Ferguson also volunteered to officiate at events throughout the weekend.

OVERALL RESULTS

Point Leo Nippers performed exceptionally well and contributed to our club achieving third place behind Ocean Grove and Torquay, the best result Point Leo has ever achieved at this level. This is testament to the dedication and commitment shown throughout the year by parents and Nippers. Congratulations to all Nippers who competed.

Overall the Club received a record number of 94 medals altogether – comprising 23 gold, 36 silver and 35 bronze. In addition to medal performances there were many personal best results achieved. It is evident now that our Nippers have the confidence, skills and determination necessary to compete with their peers at this high level. The key strengths of our Nippers are in team events, in particular the beach relays and surf teams. Focus for next season will be to improve board-paddling skills.

NEXT YEARS PROGRAM

KEY ISSUES

It was agreed the management group in preparation for the 2003/2004 season would address the following issues.

- Define the responsibilities for each of the roles;
- Define the purpose/overall role for the management group

GEAR STEWARD REPORT

This year the annual gear inspection was separated into two parts, one covering IRBs and second for the other patrol resources. Once again our pre-season preparation paid off with both inspections passing the first time round. Triggers kept the rescue boards in good condition over the season and special thanks to Adam Woods and his willing helpers for the final preparation. The separation of the IRB inspection saw increased scrutiny with all aspects of the boats and engines being reviewed. This ensured all craft hitting the beach were of an acceptable standard.

From a patrolling perspective we had a good season with each patrol and life-guards having operational equipment every day. Once again training took its toll on equipment with over 85% of rescue boards incurring some damage during the season. The positive aspect is that all the boards can be repaired at no cost, other than the goodwill of Triggers and few Club members. These boards allowed us to patrol, train a large number of Bronzies, SRCs, and support school and community groups training at the club. Although the number of boards damaged was high, it is no reason to pull back from our high level of commitment to training

Some expenditure will be required on equipment in the coming year. Additional competition rescue boards will be required and 6 to 8 rescue tubes to meet the 2003/4 demands particularly for Nipper water safety.

The IRBs performed well over the patrol season although some expenditure on motor and boat repairs was required over the winter months. The hulls will require some attention again this year to ready them for inspection, mainly the replacement of reflective tape and handles. The motors are currently running well with only the No 3 motor requiring a new compression tube, a preventative measure to increase the life of the tiller mounts. Consideration will be given this year to replacing the oldest motor with a new one. As motors age performance, reliability and value all trend in the wrong direction so a timely replacement program is appropriate

IRB REPORT

The major change on the beach this year was the introduction of the Crewing Certificate and the Victorian Boating Licence. The implications for the Club are that anyone entering an IRB in the water, other than a real patent, must have or be training for a current Crewing award and secondly anyone driving an IRB must have a current Victorian Boating Licence or interstate equivalent, and hold or be training for a current IRBD award. SLSV reimburses the cost of the boat licence on an annual basis, conditional upon current active membership and award re-qualification. Those taking two or five year licences will receive an annual payment from SLSV.

SLSA has recently reintroduced IRB completion. The program is intended to provide a forum to enhance crew and driver skills. Several rule changes have been introduced to increase competitor safety. Physical strength requirements have been reduced, dangerous events eliminated and boat speed reduced. If the Club were to participate in competition a motor would need to be sealed, ensuring no modifications, and a slower propeller acquired. The new Committee will take up the issue of IRB competition as the program will not commence until October 2003.
