# President's Report

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What a wonderful past year we've had with facility upgrades, mentor development programs, a fabulous Nipper and competition season and the long-awaited return of surf boats!

## Changeroom upgrade, new kitchen and more to come!

2018/2019 can be remembered as the season that finally saw us say goodbye to our hopelessly outdated changerooms and say hello to a new world of comfort (and low maintenance!) following the completion of the first stage of the clubhouse rebuild. Huge thanks to Luke Treadwell who did an outstanding job project managing the build. Many other Clubs have required the services of a professional project manager for a project of this scale and for Luke to do this role while also starting a new family with his beautiful twins was a huge effort, carried out with his customary no-fuss competence.

# Notes to the financial statements

## For the year ended 30 April 2019

### Note 1. Statement of significant accounting policies

#### General information

Point Leo Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. is an Association incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

Point Leo Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. is an entirely voluntary organisation which provides beach patrol and rescue services, first aid and lifesaving training at Point Leo Surf Beach and surrounds.

The financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2019 were approved and authorised for issue by the Members of the Committee of Management.

#### Financial reporting framework

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012. The Committee of Management has determined that Point Leo Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. (the Association) is not a reporting entity.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012, the recognition and measurement requirements specified by Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures'.

#### New and amended standards adopted by the Association

The Association has adopted all the amendments to Australian Accounting Standards issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board, which are relevant to and effective for the Association's financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 May 2018.

None of these amendments have had a significant impact on the Association.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money value or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

All amounts are presented in Australian dollars, unless otherwise stated.

In the application of the Association's accounting policies, the members of the committee are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following significant accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation and presentation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

**(a) Property, Plant and equipment**

Plant and equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful life of the asset to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

**(b) Inventories**

Inventories are stated in the Statement of Financial Position at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

**(c) Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments.

**(d) Income tax**

No provision for income tax has been made as the Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

**(e) Accounts Receivable and Other Receivables**

Accounts receivable are expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period and are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

**(f) Revenue and other income**

Funding for Club activities comes from membership fees, donations and gifts/sponsorships from corporate benefactors.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable after taking into account any available concessions.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method using an appropriate interest rate.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

**(g) Goods and services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

**(h) Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

### **(i) Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured using the best estimate of amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

### **(j) Impairment of assets**

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income.

### **(k) Current and non-current classification**

Assets and liabilities are presented in the Statement of Financial Position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when:

- it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the normal operating cycle;
- it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or
- the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when:

- it is either expected to be settled in the normal operating cycle;
- it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or
- there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

### **(l) Comparative information**

When required by Accounting Standards, comparatives have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current year.

### **(m) Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions**

The preparation of the financial statements requires the committee of management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other various factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The Committee of management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

**(n) Events after the reporting date**

On 3 June 2019, Point Leo Surf Life Saving Club Inc paid \$41,998 towards the replacement of the roof of the gear shed. This was paid for by using the grant of \$24,454 that was received on 31 January 2019 and the balance funded from the general account.

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of Point Leo Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the entity), which comprises the Statement of Financial Position as at 30 April 2019, the Statement of Profit or Loss and other Comprehensive Income, Statement of Members' Funds and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the entity as at 30 April 2019, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (AASB's) to the extent described in Note 1 and the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*.

**Basis for opinion**

**Other Information**

The Members of the Committee are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report for the year ended 30 April 2019, other than the financial report and our Auditors Report thereon.

# Education

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This season the Club held 5 courses for members including:

- Bronze Medallion
- Surf Rescue Certificate
- IRB Crew and Drivers
- First Aid
- Spinal Management

These awards allow us to provide a safe beach for the public and meet our requirements with LSV for a fully equipped and qualified patrol every day of the summer season.

Thank you to the fulltime instructors who assisted with the running of the course - Adam Lipszyc, Andrew Nott, Morgan Jones, Romy Lipszyc, Kaitlin Russell, Sam Richardson and Ella Swaney. Also, to the others assisting in the running of the camp.

The Adult Bronze Course was held on the first weekend of December with 16 members successfully gaining their Bronze award. Thank you to Andrew Gibson for coordinating and running the course.

Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) Camp was on the second weekend of December. The camp

was successful with 39 participants achieving their SRC. Thank you to Romy Lipszyc and Ella Swaney for running the SRC course, as well as many other fantastic helpers, including Andrew Nott for his work in assessment. Thank you also to the parent helpers who supported the camp overnight.

The Spinal Management course was a huge success; with 4 new members now holding the Spinal Management award. Many thanks to Andrew Nott for running the course.

Michelle Royal-Hebblewhite ran and assessed a very successful Senior First Aid course. The course had 7 participants learn new skills that will be extremely helpful on patrol.

# Operations

## First Aid Report

Thanks to every member who provided First Aid this season. Care for the public and our members has never been stronger, with seven new members now qualified with their Senior First Aid certificate.

Completing a Level II First Aid (or 'Senior First Aid'), not only equips you to deal with many of the common presentations we see down on the beach but is also a national accreditation which provides useful skills to apply to everyday life, in the workplace or on the street.

If you have an interest in furthering your skills, consider completing a Spinal Management or Advanced Resuscitation Techniques course both of which equip you to provide more advanced pre-hospital care in emergency situations.

Due to a change in the electronic reporting of First Aid statistics, a detailed breakdown is no

longer possible. We did however provide assistance on 35 minor and 1 major First Aid during the season. This number is marginally down on previous years, but the variance may be a factor of the new reporting method. The Ambulance was called to attend twice this season.

Once again, our team of medical doctors were vitally important during the major events we ran at the Club this season. Thank you to Kate Stern who continues to do great work coordinating our doctor members at these events.

Now that we're in the off season, if you have any ideas about how we can improve the First Aid room, with equipment, supplies or in some other way – please send me an email!

## IRB Report

Firstly, on behalf of the Point Leo IRB team, I would like to send condolences to Port Campbell SLSC and families for the tragic loss of two members during the rescue of a tourist in rough conditions in April this year.

### Equipment

Gear Inspection went like a dream with no canaries placed on any equipment. The great result was a testament to my predecessor Nick

Woods, last year's IRB captain, and Blane Paton's long-term planning. These two have left us with a shed full of top-class gear in great condition. We had no new equipment this year, but a deposit has been placed on a new Thundercat for delivery prior to the 2019/2020 season. This boat will be named the 'Dick Ellis' after our Life Patron and foundation member. Thanks Dick, for everything that you do and have done in the past for Point Leo SLSC.

## News

In July last year Andrew Gibson and I were asked to travel to 'Lake Malawi' to provide water safety for a Chinese Australian movie production called The Whistleblower. All expenses paid and a \$1350 donation to the Club for a single day on set. The scene was based around trading off small longboats and a mothership which meant lots of time in the water. Given that many of the actors could not swim, we were in close proximity to them, the pier and the boats at all times. The film crew took full advantage of our presence and also ended up using the IRB with Gibbo driving as a camera boat. They managed to finish the scenes all in a day, so our trip to Africa was short lived. The film crew also came to Melbourne in August to shoot some scenes on the Yarra and requested another two boats. Nick and Marley Woods, Bridget Barnes and Millie Page crewed and received another \$2700 for the Club. 5.00 am starts and 9.00 pm finishes meant slow days (see pic below), but a very lucrative one for the Club. ## More help

### We need more qualified people!

I know there are people at the club that stand on the beach and wonder about maybe getting in the IRB to keep busy or to add it your long list of SLSA awards. This is not an exclusive club. All you need is your Bronze and you can start.

For those families new to the protocols of SLSA, a crewed IRB is required to make up a complete patrol. An IRB also drastically reduces the number of water safety people required in Nipper sessions. An IRB covers 30 – 40 kids (conditions dependent) but a rescue board only covers 5 Nippers.

Our team can be tasked at any time of the year by LSV. Last year we received two calls, out of our normal Point Leo duty times, to put a crew together for a search. We were stood down both times due to false alarms. More recently during a Legends patrol Andrew Gibson and Nat Clarke were sent to Somers for a search. The Club can be called upon at anytime and therefore we need to keep our training and equipment up to scratch. We need to always be ready.

We have been encouraged by the transition into our group of athletes that have come from pool swimming, neighbouring clubs and also athletes that have re-engaged with surf sports after a break. It is wonderful to see young people finding their way back to our club where there will always be someone to welcome you.

We also embraced our first boat crew in many years, the Men's Reserve Team, who were steered by Mark McDermott. After competing in two carnivals they were ready for action at Senior States where they were duly rewarded with a Bronze medal.

One of my bucket list items as Team Manager was to field a Lifesaver Relay team. 'Team Tierney' was wonderfully represented by a team of 9 of our senior athletes placing an impressive 5<sup>th</sup> at State Titles. Tamara Brawn is our only active female surf boat rower and the club would love to see a women's rowing team again at Point Leo. Big congratulations to Tamara for winning a Gold Medal at Aussies Masters with her Lorne club teammates.

"Official" Officials was a key message from Life Saving Victoria this year. We had several members take on the responsibility and complete the training courses. Our pre-existing officials also became compliant with new technical standards. We are no longer able to

supply unaccredited officials at carnivals, so I encourage your engagement in this area. It enables greater fairness and transparency for our competitors when good, capable judges are on the line.

Congratulations to Isabella Austin and Caitlin Robinson who were selected to represent Victoria in the Interstate Beach and Pool lifesaving events respectively.

We attended carnivals at Mornington, Anglesea, Torquay, Ocean Grove and Mordialloc and hosted a carnival at Point Leo again this season. Some of our senior athletes substituted Victorian carnivals for the "Ocean 6" series of events to race against more formidable opponents in an effort to gain more experience in strong surf conditions in preparation for Aussies. SLSA are looking at an alternative interstate competition program and reintroduction of the Nutri-grain series events. More information will be provided as this comes to hand.

We had an amazing State Titles at Warrnambool over the Labour Day Weekend with 36 competitors. The athletes achieved 31 top 3 placings and 62 top 6 placings. We had some great results in all areas of competition, Champion Lifesaver events, Surf Boats, Board, Ski, Swim and Belt races. We have a multi skilled and flexible team who strongly supported each other throughout the competition. It is a credit to them.

A full house team dinner brought together the Point Leo families on Saturday night and a Sunday night pizza in the park the following day was a lot of fun to finish off the weekend.

The Australian Titles (Aussies) were held at Broadbeach Qld this year. The conditions were extremely challenging and resulted in the relocation of the women's area to Kirra Beach, Coolangatta. Special thanks to Nick Clarke who went into immediate ground control of the trailer logistics, Jon and Nick Ford, David

Austin and Dianne Summers for split team duties, as well as parents and drivers for getting athletes to and from the second location and back to Broadbeach for finals. I have nothing but praise for the ability of the team to adapt to sudden change. Going to an event with the attitude to be prepared for all kinds of varying conditions, amended programs, relocations and you will be able to cope with the change more readily. It is the nature of our sport.

We had some outstanding efforts at the championships with Bella Austin making an U17 Ski Final, Bella Ford the Open Single Ski Quarter Final, Caitlin Robinson U19 Belt Race Grand Final taking 6<sup>th</sup> place, Bella Ford and Nick Ford coming 13<sup>th</sup> in the Open Mixed Double Ski Grand Final and Bella Austin, Cassidy Lockhart-Meaney and Caitlin Robinson making it to the Grand Final of the U19 Taplin. Nathaniel Clarke was a representative in the U17 Champion Lifesaver Grand Final taking 8<sup>th</sup> place. Our Masters also competed well with a silver medal to Frank Christian in the 60-69 2km Ocean Swim, Haydn Tierney a gold medal in the 35-39 2km Ocean Swim and an amazing effort from Nick Clarke, Jon Ford and Haydn Tierney for a Bronze Medal in the 130+ Board Relay.

A unified team is a blessing and as Team Manager I have seen this grow over more recent years. We have as a group, embraced a zero-tolerance base in respect of our attitudes and behaviours in our club tent which has played out in our increased respect for each other and those around us whilst wearing

## Head Coach's Report

This season was highly successful for the Surf Sports Program at many levels including:

- Outstanding results at Aussies with several finalists and many other athletes progressing through multiple rounds
- Improved inclusiveness at training and competition with 36 athletes competing at Senior State Titles
- Increased participation at Nipper carnivals and training with the club improving to 7<sup>th</sup> at State Titles
- Maintaining a high-level training culture in Nippers and Seniors
- Improved confidence and capabilities of our Nipper Activity Leaders
- Expansion of the Victorian Surf Sports Academy (VSSA) program with the

formation of kayaking squads at Patterson Lakes and Fairfield

- Marked improvement in surf skills due to weekly sessions at Gunnamatta
- Completion of Lifechanger program Wave 2 with greater involvement of members outside of the Surf Sports Program and outstanding participant feedback

Our Senior results built on a successful revamp of our training program in 2018 which included opportunities for athletes to train up to 15 sessions per week in a carefully planned and periodised training program that included swim, board, ski, iron, run, gym and core. Significant additional focuses for 2019 were the development of ski paddler water feel and technique through our kayak program. Two of our Aussies final results were in ski (Open Mixed Double Ski with Bella Ford/Nick Ford and U17 Ski with Bella Austin) which provides evidence on the value of this approach.

In addition, our surf skills at Broadbeach in challenging conditions were notably improved due to weekly sessions (and in the lead up to Aussies every session) at Gunnamatta irrespective of the conditions. We are now in a position to make surf skills a primary strength.

This year we also had a dedicated pool and Coolangatta Gold training program with pool squads running out of MSAC and Hastings. Josh Doherty in particular flourished in this training environment with his swimming and Iron improving markedly, resulting in him winning the Open Coolangatta Gold age category. Josh was also close to making the semi-finals in Iron at Aussies which is an awesome achievement in his first year of Open.

Nipper participation and training have continued to improve thanks to the tireless work of Nick Clarke in the Surf Sports training sessions as well as the Thursday night iron/transition sessions. Under the coordination of Julia O'Shaughnessy we also had a fantastic group of Activity Leaders continue to develop their coaching skills in the three-week Junior Surf Lifesaving Program.

Overall there was substantial improvement in inclusiveness around the Surf Sports program. Thanks to the leadership of the senior athletes

It was difficult to split the awards between our highly successful athletes and Isabella Austin was one who had an outstanding year, including representing Victoria in the State Team. Her efforts under duress (illness) at State Titles to support her team mates across U17, U19 and Open were fantastic and resulted in 8 individual and team medals and many points for the club. She also had a great Aussies finishing 7<sup>th</sup> in the U17 Ski Final. She has had a great season of development as an athlete both mentally and physically and is a key member of the squad. Isabella Austin is the recipient of the **Board and Ski Competitor of the Year Award**.

Kate Brooks is an elite pool swimmer and has worked hard on her surf skills resulting in a great State Titles with 4 medals including a Gold in Belt and Silver in Board Rescue as well as Surf Teams. Kate makes every effort to get to training and state/interstate carnivals despite a busy pool swimming program. Her efforts are truly appreciated. Kate Brooks is the recipient of the **Swim Competitor of the Year Award**.

James Paton spent most of the season enjoying life and focusing on patrolling duties. However, he has an enormous fitness base and after some encouragement agreed to attend the State Titles. He came away with Gold in the 2km Run and Silver in the 2 x 1km Beach Relay; a fantastic outcome. It was great to have James back in the competition tent. James Paton is the recipient of the **Beach Competitor of the Year Award**.

Looking towards season 2019/2020 and beyond there are amazing things happening including:

- Dedicated surf sessions at Gunnamatta every Saturday to further develop the necessary skills to match it with the best at Broadbeach next year
- Continued expansion of our kayak program to support ski paddlers out of

Patterson Lakes and Fairfield in conjunction with the Victorian Surf Sports Academy (VSSA) squads

- Interstate racing planned for at least three carnivals next season plus Aussies
- Continuation of our high-quality board/ski/swim/run/gym/core program enabling athletes to reach their potential
- Opportunities for Cadets and less experienced athletes through a range of development sessions on board and ski
- Continued support of our Nippers through the Junior Surf Lifesaving and Junior Surf Sports Programs with additional surf sessions planned through winter.

I'd like to finish with a comment on the Lifechanger Program that completed Wave 2 (the second iteration of this amazing program). This program involved six sessions with Trevor Hendy and other mentors from the Lifechanger

program aiming to help young people become their best selves. It was amazing to have mentor representatives from the Club also attending including Andrew Nott, Isabella Ford, Bodhi Woods, Brittany Morgenthaler, Charlie Cassell-Ashton, Dianne Summers, Ellie Doherty, Ella Laussen, James Paton, Joshua Doherty, Lachlan Robinson, Lily McMeeken, Michele Ford, Nicholas Ford, Rhys Cole, Sam Richardson, Sharyn Clarke, Tara Doherty, Zali Cargill and Michael Treadwell. These mentors will become the future of the Wave 3 Lifechanger program planned for summer 2019/2020. Formal and informal data suggest the program has resulted in a strengthening culture and connection of all those involved.

We are always encouraging greater participation in Surf Sports as a beginner, aspiring athlete, master, coach, mentor or support person. There are opportunities for everyone to help support this growing and vibrant section of our club. If you are interested contact me on 0422 244 183 or

## Surf boat Report

This season saw the resurrection of the boat section with a Men's Reserve crew competing at local carnivals for the first time in ten years. I am pleased to be able to fulfil my commitment to Ron "Bomber" Murray in returning to the club after three decades with North Cottesloe SLSC to continue with the boat section that provided me the opportunity to row as a seventeen-year-old.

The first task was to locate the equipment and with some local guidance we dusted off the oars, rolled over the boats and set about recruiting some personnel. We were fortunate in locating some experienced surf rowers in search of opportunity and with the addition of former Point Leo A Grade rower Ant Williams, we assembled a well credentialed Reserve Grade crew. To put the division status in perspective, there are six Open Men's and 16 Reserve crews competing at carnivals in Victoria.

Starting relatively late in the season the crew was subjected to some erratic training phases in preparation for our first carnival at Anglesea. Whilst a podium finish was unexpected, I gained greater satisfaction from the astonishment in the announcer's voice when introducing the Point Leo crew on the starting line. For me the recognition of our return to competition is important to the legacy of our former rowers and our goal to re-establish Point Leo as a premier rowing club.

With an improved performance at the following carnival we were anticipating a prominent showing at Masters States and the ASRL Open in NSW. Unfortunately, due to injury and admin issues, we were unable to field a crew at those events.

Our sights were now firmly set on the States at Warrnambool as the crew embarked on a structured ergo and water training program in

preparation for what we believed to be an event that would acknowledge our return to competition. In addition, we were able to field a Lifesaver Relay Team providing valuable points to the overall club point score. Given the requirements of the relay event, we elected to have a female row in the relay leg to strengthen one of the other disciplines. A huge thanks to Ella Laussen who volunteered to row in what proved to be testing surf for an experienced rower let alone for someone who had two training sessions at Port Melbourne! Ella took the baptism of fire in her stride and proved she has natural boatie qualities.

After some close finishes in the Reserve Grade preliminary rounds, the Point Leo 'Pretenders' advanced to the final and rowed themselves into the Bronze medal position after a powerful lift in the closing stages of the race. I think it took Ant Williams a few minutes to realise the race was finished as he wasn't responding to my command to exit the boat! Thanks to the crew of Dave Spitiri, Tom Skidmore, Bryon Marshall, Luke Hume and the evergreen Ant Williams for their contribution and to the resurrection of the boat section.

As with all clubs, there are those working in the background that provide valuable support and encouragement. I would like to thank Kim Williams, Tamara Brawn, Iris Cassell, Andrew Gibson, Andrew Welsh, John Horwood, Bomber Murray and Gary McKellar. Sincere appreciation

to Tamara and Ant for their outstanding generosity and support.

Whilst getting a boat on the water is a fairly straight forward process, the administration side of qualifying a crew for competition is possibly more strenuous! Without the patience and knowledge of Kim Williams and the expert guidance of Tamara Brawn, I doubt whether we would have rowed a stroke in competition this season. Thank you. We're all now wiser for the experience.

After an encouraging season we're looking to grow the Boat section with the introduction of our Strategic Plan, Boat Section Policy and Recruitment Strategy.

Expressions of interest have now been advertised and we look forward to presenting Point Leo boat crews at local and interstate competition next season.

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### Junior Surf Life Saving Program

The 2018/2019 Junior Surf Lifesaving Program (JSLP) was once again a huge success on many levels and we continue to deliver an outstanding program for our Nippers.

Our program is so successful due to the outstanding volunteer support of many people including parents, siblings, former Nippers, senior athletes and wider club members. We continue to attract healthy numbers of participants at each age level with 471 participants and over 300 families involved.

It is because of our selfless volunteers and their commitment to the development of our younger surf lifesavers that we continue to be one of the most sought after Nipper programs in the State. The results are obvious in our engaged, smiling, happy and enthusiastic Nippers and families.



We continue to offer training opportunities for our volunteers in Bronze, IRB, LSV Officials courses and also introduced an Activity Leaders Masterclass (led by our Club coaches) to encourage new leaders. This resulted in 18 new Nipper Activity Leaders being recruited for the season.

Our Junior Club Captains, Giselle Northcote and Fox Handley and Junior Vice-Captains, Zoe Warner and Campbell Findlay provided

positive and strong leadership, also helping at our Multi-cultural day, Nipper social nights and Disabled Surfing day. Along with the Under 14 cohort, they proved themselves to be invaluable mentors to our younger Nippers. We hope they have enjoyed their journey with us, and we look forward to seeing them next season around the Club practising their skills and expertise.

Our most enthusiastic Nippers commenced training in October 2018 with the season concluding at the end of February 2019 at the LSV Junior State Surf Lifesaving Championships in Lorne. The weather during the intensive program over January was extremely mild and brought with it opportunities to negotiate some Point Leo waves.

Each season we aim to increase opportunities for involvement in Nipper and club activities and this year the JSLP had Sun Smart visit and provide resources and we also organised a health and nutrition session in January.

Our Junior Surf Sports Coach, Nick Clarke, continued to offer training sessions through our Junior Surf Sports Program (JSSP) and experienced an increase in attendance throughout the season. Having Nick now assess water competencies has encouraged others to attend and gain some open water training and experience before the summer begins.

This season Point Leo increased its participation in the LSV Junior Carnivals. Unfortunately, due to weather and water conditions, most carnivals were severely

impaired. However, that did not dampen our enthusiasm or appetite to compete, as we introduced some Nipper 'training carnival' days with other clubs to keep our competition skills sharp and provide essential carnival training for our competition team. Thank you to Jason Romari, our Junior Competition Manager, who navigated our way through a challenging competition season. Thank you also to all the parents, age managers and assistants, officials, coaches and water safety for their commitment, dedication and patience supporting their children and other nippers at these carnivals.

Point Leo offers participation in all beach and water disciplines and is successful in each of them at Junior Carnivals. For the first time in recent years, we participated in R & R with three Under 11/12 teams. We are also gaining momentum with our State March Past team ranking highly in only our second year back. With a new flag, a new belt, a reconditioned reel and under the coaching of Long John Silver and Jan Williams, this event is gaining popularity and makes everyone feel proud to be 'Team Leo'.

We sent 92 competitors to the LSV Junior State Lifesaving Championships at Lorne, won medals in every age level and gained a strong medal tally despite the team water events being cancelled. It should also be noted that we had a large number of Top 10 results to go along with our medals which shows the great depth of talent and skill that we have.

It was exciting that seven of our Under 13s (below) took the opportunity to be involved in the LSV Under 13 Development Camp this season with overwhelmingly positive feedback received from all participants. The camp sounded like it was a lot of fun! I encourage all Nippers to embrace the opportunities available and grab the chance to be further involved in Surf Lifesaving activities offered.

## Gary Tierney Foundation

### The Past Twelve Months

The conservative approach to fundraising for the Foundation adopted in the previous financial year continued over the 12 months to 30 April 2019. There were no fundraising events held with income only being sourced from donations and interest received. The Foundations initial capital base target of \$200,000 has been maintained. The situation will continue to be reviewed in the 12 months to 30 April 2020.

At an Advisory Meeting held in November 2018 the existing GTF Fellowship Grant of \$3000 was discussed and after consideration it was agreed

to increase the Grant to \$3600 (\$1200 per annum). The increase is to apply to all annual grants yet to be paid. It was also agreed to review the amount of the Fellowship Grant every 2 years.

In the past 12 months annual Fellowship Grants amounting to \$6000 were made and funding assistance of \$2800 was provided to thirteen Point Leo active members competing in the National Titles at Broadbeach, Queensland. Funding of \$600 was provided to assist a club member with the purchase of specialist competitive equipment and another \$300 was provided to another member to assist with

competition travel costs. The Foundation also contributed the sum of \$3000 toward the cost of the Club's Lifechanger program. These payments are in line with the Gary Tierney Foundation's Governance Charter.

## Financials

At the 30 April 2019 the Foundation funds balance stands at \$230,461, an increase of \$2,330 over the balance as at 30 April 2018. Over the twelve month period income to the Foundation was made up of \$5,050 from donations and \$9,980 being interest from the bank account and term deposits. Details of the outgoings of \$12,700 are included in the previous paragraph.

The investment of \$70,000 in the Surf Life Saving Rescue Fund was valued at \$77,363 at the 30 April 2019. The balance of funds invested of \$153,098 is with the Bendigo Bank in cash and in term deposits at competitive rates of interest.

The Advisory Board reviews these investments on a regular basis and have maintained the conservative but slightly competitive approach to the Foundations investments.

## Gary Tierney Foundation 2019 Fellows– Joshua Doherty and Samuel Richardson

The 2019 Fellowship was awarded jointly to Josh Doherty and Sam Richardson. Both Josh and Sam started as Nippers at Point Leo SLSC and have continued on to Senior ranks as valuable club members. Josh is a fierce competitor, assists teammates in a coaching role and has set himself some high ranking but achievable goals in the competition field. Sam also has been a fine competitor and has more recently directed his efforts toward Club lifesaving, marketing, and social media presence.

## The Future

The Advisory Board will continue to provide financial support to allow younger members of Point Leo SLSC to fulfil their potential in surf lifesaving. The Foundation will provide grants or funding as Fellowship Grants or as Single Purpose Grants.

As indicated earlier in this report, the Foundation provided the Club with an amount of \$3,000 that was part of the cost of the Lifechanger series entitled "Awaken the Hero Workshop". This involved up to 80 Club Nippers with more senior Active Members in a mentoring role and was completed in January 2019 at Point Leo. The Advisory Board intends discussing the viability of remaining involved financially in the Lifechanger series with Club management before making any future commitment.

Following a presentation by a club member, Bodhi Woods, about the Lord and Ladies Somers Camp it was agreed that the Foundation should extend its grants program to include contributions to the cost of Club members participating in appropriate development activities such as the Somers camp.

No discussions have taken place in regard to fundraising for the next 12 months.

## Gary Tierney Foundation Governance

The Gary Tierney Foundation is managed by an Advisory Board. As at 30 April the Board consisted of Tom Mollenkopf (Chairperson), John Horwood, Ian Knight, Haydn Tierney, Bella Ford, Kelvin Anderson and Tamara Brawn. During the year one of the original Advisory Board members, Richard Batchelor, stepped down and Tamara Brawn accepted our invitation to join the Board.

The Foundation's Patron is Louise Tierney. Over the past 12 months the Advisory Board has met formally on two occasions and on a number of informal occasions.

The Foundation's finances are audited annually as part of the Club's statutory audit and maintains a separate bank account to ensure that donations to the Foundation are quarantined

and only used in accordance with and as specified by the Foundation's Governance Charter.

### **Gear & Equipment**

The 2018/2019 season saw considerable changes around the club.

Two new shipping containers were placed at the rear of the Club for storage. One container is being used to store the Disabled Surfing Association equipment whilst the other was purchased by the Club and is housing boards

and skis to meet the needs of the ever-expanding Senior competition team.

The Surf Boat section is being revitalised and storage space needs to be found to keep their equipment secure. There will be consolidation of their equipment and potential purchase of a new (second-hand) boat. The Gear Shed is being

reconfigured to accommodate and support their requirements.

The old gym was decommissioned to make way for the new uniform shop and provide additional gear storage space. This storage space opens onto the Gear Shed courtyard via a roller door and will be used to store a fully operational IRB that can be accessed at short notice. There will also be enough room to keep a number of rescue boards.

LSV rolled out their new digital radio network prior to the commencement of the season.

These radios have amazing capabilities including GPS locating, duress button and communication recording. There have been a few teething problems relating to their receiving and transmitting functionality. Improvements have been made and network enhancements should improve their performance.

## Clubhouse & Facilities

There has been a lot happening!

The major changeroom works were completed just in time for the new season and have been very well-received after many years of the old damp, dark and mouldy toilets. The alternative exit on the East side of the Club has changed the way we operate and reduced internal congestion. The 'bag-drop' area has been a great success and provides a 'chill out space' for online social networking (ie. playing with your phone).

The previous excellent kitchen had to make way for the Amenities rebuild and was replaced with a 'galley' style, sponsored by Balnarring and District Community Bank Branch of the Bendigo Bank. The Patrol kitchenette also made way for the new Amenities and was rebuilt by volunteers in a corner of the Patrol Room.

The long narrow Gym had to make way for the Uniform Shop, which in turn made way for the new Amenities. Given the low usage of the Gym, it was consigned to the history books. The new model Uniform Shop works very

The Senior board and ski trailer was modified to increase the number of craft it can carry. Nick Clarke and Andrew Gibson applied their engineering skills to add an additional level of racking. This change is significant as the trailer was not big enough to cater for the transport needs of the competition team.

Thank you to this dedicated band of volunteers for the multitude of tasks completed.

effectively. The timber facade of the Amenities was carried over to the Shop and the contemporary styling has enhanced the appearance of the club.

The 45 year old gear shed roof has been replaced with funding from a \$24,000 grant sourced by Mick Treadwell. This will improve security and it will be good not to have rust flakes in your IRB after every strong wind.

A small space was available opening into the courtyard and this has been co-opted as a place to keep the 'rescue-ready' IRB for easy access in after hours emergencies.

The space behind the Clubhouse was cleaned up and levelled by volunteers and made into a more usable space. Work will continue here over winter to make this into a family friendly area out of the wind.

Volunteers used the pavers from the old Gym to build a path along the East side to access the new Amenities via the rear door. This has reduced the foot traffic through the carpeted areas.

Volunteers also built three outside showers to enable sand wash-off before entering the Amenities.

Faulty wiring caused a fire that damaged many of our electrical appliances including fridges, air-conditioners and the solar power rectifier. Peninsula Heating, Cooling and Electrical from Hastings (past Club Captain Adam Woods) were fantastic in setting up a temporary supply the same day and then replacing all the damaged circuitry. The whole schemozzle is still subject to an insurance claim.

Rob and Deb Howell returned for the Winter, providing cleaning and security services.
