Early Days at Point Leo

It is enlightening to look at the first nineteen months of the club's life from quite a few angles. A lot of this history is documented in our excellent publication "Fifty Years of Service and Achievement" however when you dig a little deeper there are some historical matters that the club can be very proud of and that should be shared with our current members.

Point Leo SLSC officially commenced operations on 1st April 1955 (yes, April Fool's Day) and in the period between that opening date and 19 months later, in November 1956, twenty-five new members to the club had gained their Bronze Medallion. There were a few other members who had transferred, fully qualified, from other clubs and there were several new members who were not yet aged 16 but who had gained their Qualifying Certificate.

Two of these new senior members were John Marshall and John Forsyth and I think that it is interesting and indeed very satisfying to look at their achievements in the surf in that first nineteen months of the club's history.

Firstly, we will start with the younger of the two, John "Fizzle" Forsyth. John gained his bronze medallion in the club's first Bronze squad in November 1955. Fizzle was a very competent swimmer at his school, Scotch College and a regular swimmer with Old Scotch Swimming Club at events around Melbourne. But once he got into the surf he excelled, his ability to "read" the

surf conditions and “sniff” out a wave was outstanding, and he was most competitive and had no fear in the surf.

On the other hand, John Marshall joined the club and had a different pedigree. He was an excellent pool swimmer and had represented Australia at the 1948 London Olympics gaining Silver in the 1500 meters and Bronze in the 400 meters and had represented the country at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics making the final in the 1500 meters. On top of his fine efforts at the Olympics he at one stage held the world record for every freestyle distance between 200 yards and one mile. John gained his bronze medallion on 4th March 1956 and soon showed that he was looking forward to getting involved in the hurly-burly of surf swimming.

The year 1956 was a big year in Melbourne – the city had been successful in the bid for the Olympics, and they were to be held in late November and early December and in association with this big event the International and Australian Surf Championships were scheduled for 25th November and 2nd December 1956 at Torquay.

Leo started competing at carnivals immediately after the first Bronze squad went through and by the time that the State Titles were held at Anglesea a reasonable, although small in numbers, team had been assembled.

Results at the States were excellent-

Following the carnival two Victorian Teams were selected to represent the state at the International Carnival later in 1956 at Torquay. In the “A” team were John Marshall and John Forsyth, and in the “B” team was Peter Stone. Not bad for a club not even 12 months old and with about 25 senior qualified members. In the Senior Surf, John Marshall led for most of the swim only to be beaten by Graeme Bennett of Torquay who cracked a wave just after rounding the buoys.

To add to the intrigue John Marshall, having been left out of the freestyle squad from which the Australian team would be selected for the 1956 Olympics decided to attempt to make the team swimming the new stroke butterfly. After an intensive training effort and a successful stint at the National Swimming Titles he was selected for his third Olympics, swimming butterfly.

John Marshall swam at the Olympic Games and made the final of the 200 metre butterfly and finished 5th, not a bad effort for someone who had just taken up that swimming stroke.

Then came the Surf Life Saving events at Torquay. The first carnival, the International Surf Carnival on 25th November attracted a crowd of 50,000 to see 1700 competitors from overseas and Australian clubs. The traffic was so heavy that it was virtually a grid lock from Geelong to Torquay, and the road from Melbourne to Geelong wasn’t much better. The Victorian team finished fourth, with John Forsyth finishing 3rd in the Junior Belt and John Marshall 2nd in the Senior Surf race.

The next weekend was the National Titles. The crowd was estimated at around 15,000, possibly lower because of the weather which was not the best. But the competition was hot and Point Leo fared very well with John Marshall winning silver in the Senior Surf. He had the lead for most of the swim only to take the wrong line to the beach and being beaten in the run to finish by Brian Hutchings of Bondi, one of the best surf swimmers ever. Fizzle Forsyth ended up with bronze in the Junior Belt beaten by Col McFarlane of Manly who went to win more National Gold medals in R&R and belt and surf races.

Ironically it was Col McFarlane who looked after a number of Leo members who ventured to Sydney and to Manly in the 60’s like the Dude Kinsey, Fizzle, Dick Batchelor and myself.

So, when you think about it, it wasn’t a bad effort by the young Leo club. Twenty five or so qualified bronze medallion members, two guys who had very little experience in the surf and one of whom had represented Australia in the pool just prior to the surf carnivals. Silver

and a bronze, great start to a very competitive and successful period ahead!

I was still at school finishing year 11, Leaving Certificate in those days, and whilst things do get a little hazy, I do have some great memories of those Torquay carnivals.

Alan Forster of Point Leo was the chairman of the Welfare and Reception Committee and Leo members were co-opted to meet the International competitors at Southern Cross Station (in those days, Spencer Street Station) and direct them to their accommodation at the Showgrounds – that is correct they had beds at the Halls of Manufacturers and Agriculture prior to them going to the camping grounds at Torquay. My highlight was meeting a guy from South Africa who had been bitten on two different occasions by a shark and survived, obviously, in Durban.

Most Leo members went to the carnivals and we stayed in a house in Torquay owned by the uncle of one of our members. We all crowded into the garage of a 2 story house sleeping on the concrete floor in sleeping bags. We had plenty of style in those days.

John Marshall arrived on the second week with a young guy in tow and he asked around to see whether someone could lend a pair of togs to his mate, John. Eddie Kidd obliged, and it turned out that the borrower was a very young John Konrads who had been a reserve in the 1956 team but did go on to win gold in the 1500 meters at Rome in 1960, plus silver in the 4X200 relay and bronze in the individual 400 meters

freestyle. And Eddie didn't see his togs again!!

Sadly, John Marshall was killed in a car smash in January 1957. Who knows what impact John would have had on the Surf Life Saving movement both as a competitor and a lifesaver. I suspect huge! Fizzle Forsyth continued to compete in the surf very successfully, became Leo club captain, was awarded a John Wishart Memorial Medal by LSV and is an Honorary Life Member of Point Leo SLSC.

As they say – “from little things, big things grow”. We just must remember the start and keep things going!

An interview with Alf Treadwell

Session 2: Alf Treadwell

Discussion with Mr Alf Treadwell (Life member & all-round great supporter of the Point Leo SLSC) Alf & his family have a long history at the club. A dedicated member who with his enthusiasm has made being around the club fun & cohesive.

Q1: How did you become involved with the Point Leo SLSC?

It was through Kevin Rydberg, who attended the Essendon Baths. A group of us from the baths were taken by one of the dads down to Point Leo and it was from this time on that Point Leo became our place to go to. We lived in Moonee Ponds and were the first group of members to the point Leo SLSC to come from the north of the Yarra. In 1964 we were viewed as “the scum from the north”!!

Our first visits to Leo resulted us in camping at East creek, on the Merricks side. We camped on the beach without a tent, just in sleeping bags.

Why Leo – Who knows!

In 1964/65 season Alf joined the Point Leo SLSC and did his Bronze in 1966.

Q2: What was the club like in 1966?

You were not meant to have access to the club without participating in Patrol; but that was a bit of a loose rule. The club president at the time was Jeff Raws (referred to as “skinny”). Alan Forster (nick name Chappy) was a main influence at the club at that time.

We built one of the shacks from an old bungalow that we dismantled out of Essendon. It was brought down on the back of a truck. From our shack you could see 1st reef & from my top bunk I had a good view.

Q3: What did you get up to when camping down at Leo?

In those days most of us had guns, so target practice & taking aim at the bell was common.

We would go spot lighting at night in the area that is now Point Leo Estate as well as on the Raw’s property & along the foreshore. Shooting rabbits & foxes was common.

Guns were banned when a seagull landed at the feet of “Chappy” who from that time on said no more firearms.

Q4: Outside of Leo, what where your pursuits?

I played a lot of cricket for Essendon & played 50 games in the 2nds & 3rds for the Essendon FC. At the Essendon FC I met Phil Boyce who joined Point Leo SLSC. There was also a group from St Mary’s football club in Glen Iris who joined the SLSC. My cousin Alan Martello, my brother Ed and the Rooks all joined at the same time.

I was an apprentice fitter & turner in those early days. Then later taught at trades schools.

Q5: How did you become involved in the Boat section at Point Leo SLSC?

My initial strength was beach sprints & running. But as it turned out they were short of surf boat crews, so I ended up rowing. In 1968 we won a gold at Anglesea. We would train 4 or 5 nights a week. We would meet at 5:30 a.m. at the Melbourne boat sheds. We would row up to Heron Island, doing sprints between the bridges. Back by 7:00 a.m. On alternate nights we would all meet at the Myer Music Bowl and run the Tan or the hills at the Bowl. On Saturdays we would generally meet at Leo to row. Gary McKellar was our boat captain at the time. We were notorious for breaking gear. We rowed the boat named the Westernport while the top crew had The Trump.

Most of our training sessions at Leo were off second reef.

In the late 60’s our major competitors were Warrnambool. My position in the boat was at #2.

The Biggest wave we caught was at Jan Juc. The waves were coming down from the sky. 3 metre + surf.

We slid down this large wave and we kept sliding & sliding; then it reformed, and we were off again with the wave punching the boat through the mist & white water.

Exhilarating stuff.

Q6: When did you come to live on the Peninsula?

In 1984 Anne & I came to live in Red Hill. Starting our family with Julia & there after the two boys Luke & Michael.

We stayed involved in Point Leo SLSC most of our years. We did have time out in 1970 when Anne & I went to live overseas. I had won a scholarship for fitting & turning. Two years in the UK installing canning machines. Then went to Greece for a few months. We bought an Alfa Romeo and toured Europe.

Q7: When did the family become involved in the club?

Julia started in Nippers with the boys being dragged along at the ages of 2 & 3 years.

I was involved in assisting Nippers as 2IC to the leadership of Peter Gibson, Peter Willens, Jill McKellar & Rod Smallman.

I looked after the Under 6’s. We would jump waves, build sandcastles, let them find a pulse (basic stuff to lead them into further first aid in following age groups) We had races but we didn’t have winners as such. There was no competition, it was all about participation. On wet days we had colouring in events.

Q8: How did the Nipper BBQ start?

After Nippers, people would just walk off. So, we had to find a way to keep people from just finishing nippers and walking off. We got hold of a good BBQ & charged everyone \$1. This got you a stamp and a sausage. Once everyone had their sausage you were entitled to a free sausage if available.

We then came up with a family package where we would charge a family \$50. For this you we receive a car pass, and we would print some tee shirts for the nippers. We didn't really make money, but these initiatives started to get people to stay and join the club.

In the early days the club did not have many funds and at some times the BBQ moneys would go to pay for the petrol to run the IRB'S.

Q9: How do you view the Point Leo SLSC and its character?

When you hit the beach, everyone is the same regardless of their background. People in general are generous and giving of their time to the club. It's a great place to be.

Over the years Alf held several positions within the club. Like most, his first official appointment was as Gear Steward and then Chief Instructor.

It was a pleasure to have this chat with Alfie.
